Our school is a village primary school admitting pupils aged between three and eleven years. It is situated in the village of Wing near Leighton Buzzard. We value and encourage the 'village school' ethos and the school's involvement in village life.

Our school provides a caring and safe environment based on mutual respect, where children achieve their full potential and develop creative, enquiring minds to prepare them for future opportunities and challenges.

The school has four interlinked buildings which are modern, spacious and well maintained. There is a large school hall, the classrooms are large and light and there are designated rooms and areas for Art, Music, Computing, and Design Technology. We also have a covered heated swimming pool.

The school is fortunate to have extensive grounds with far reaching views. Within this there is a large playing field, a playground and a special garden area for those children who prefer to sit quietly. The Nursery has its own large, well-planned outdoor area with an all weather play surface and a spacious covered area allowing learning outdoors to be an integral part of every day.

What will my child learn?



Early Years Foundation Stage (Nursery and Reception)

Your child will be learning skills and acquiring new knowledge across 7 areas of learning and development:

- Communication and language
- Physical development
- Personal, social and emotional development
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the world
- Expressive arts and design





The wide variety of activities includes speaking, listening, working with shapes, space and number and using modern technology. Music, dance, role play and imaginative play will extend the children's creative skills. Physically, the children will develop their co-ordination, control and movement through formal PE sessions and playing: both outside in the play area, and inside with water, sand and paint.

The Foundation stage is a fulfilling and enjoyable experience for our pupils providing a strong basis for a future of successful learning.

By the end of the Reception year, children's skills are above those expected for their age in all areas of learning.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2) Key Stage 2 (Years 3, 4, 5 & 6)

Our carefully planned curriculum will help your child to become proficient not only in Numeracy and Literacy, but to become a confident, independent learner and to develop a lively and enquiring mind with the ability to gain, and use, knowledge, skills and attitudes relevant to her/his future life.

Literacy and Numeracy is taught in a cross-curricular approach. Through the cross-curricular approach, the children study:

- Science

- History
- Art and Technology
- French
- Music
- PE and Games
- PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education)
- 'Philosophy for Children' (P4C)
- Religious Education



Information Communication Technology is an integral part of the school curriculum and practice. The children have access to PCs, iPads and other digital software

Standards have improved in all subjects in Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 over time and are above average overall by the end of Year 6.

How we enrich your child's education

Forest School

Forest School sessions are a tried and tested format which seeks to encourage, motivate, engage and inspire children through positive outdoor experiences. Your child will spend regular sessions in an area of woodland that is natural, safe and accessible, working to their usual curriculum but in an outdoor setting.

Forest school sessions allow children:

- The time and space to explore and learn at their own pace
- To develop a relationship with their outdoor environment through frequent and regular experiences throughout the year
- To use their own inherent individual style of learning
- To develop their own self esteem and confidence
- To learn to work as part of a team
- Opportunities to make their own assessment of risk
- Opportunities to develop thinking, speaking and problem solving
- Opportunities to build on their innate motivation and positive attitude to learning
- Opportunities to help them understand, appreciate and care for the natural environment.





Eco Council

The school Eco Council has two elected representatives from each year. Eco-Schools is an international award programme that guides schools on their sustainable journey, providing a framework to help embed these principles into the heart of school life. The elected representatives meet regularly to implement new ideas, schemes and other 'green' initiatives. Overstone Combined School is delighted to have been awarded their coveted Green Flag by the Eco Council.

Music lessons

Specialist teachers visit the school to teach:

- Guitar
- Flute
- Clarinet
- Violin

There is a charge for these music lessons.

Additional responsibilities

Year 6 pupils also have a range of responsibilities in the school, such as helping to run the School Shop, helping in the Nursery, Junior Leaders and acting as 'buddies' in the playground for the younger children.

- Keyboard
- Drums
- Brass instruments.

The 'Junior Leaders' and 'buddy system' are well received and encourage pupils to support each other.

School Council

Our School Council plays an important role in the life of the school and allows pupil opinion to feed into school developments. Each class (from Year 1 to Year 6) elects two representatives to the School Council each year. The School Council meets regularly and is pupil-led, with children acting as the Chair and the Secretary to the Council. Each member of the School Council proudly wears a shiny badge to show his/her status.

Clubs

Children are able to take part in a wide variety of clubs and activities, which take place at lunchtimes and after school. These are organised by members of staff.

Sporting clubs include:

- Athletics
- Football
- Netball
- Cricket
- Cross-country.

The netball and football teams regularly play matches against other local schools.

There is a diverse range of additional clubs available to the children including

- Choir
- School newspaper
- Dance
- Recorders
- Gardening
- Cookery
- Sewing
- Art.

School visits

Educational visits are an integral part of the curriculum and the school arranges a variety of day visits to places of interest for children from Year 1. In addition, a number of groups and individuals visit the school to perform or talk to the children.



Links with the community

Strong links with the local community are an important aspect of school life, this includes:

- Year 6 children hosting a tea party for senior residents of the village
- Senior residents are also invited to the dress rehearsals of all concerts
- Delivery of harvest festival boxes to local residents
- Hosting an Open Evening and Community Information Fair to facilitate access to a range of information about local services.

We also encourage a sense of participation in the global community through a link with a school in Si Kunda in the Gambia via the locally-based charity 'Friends of Si Kunda', and representatives from within the village give occasional presentations about the charity's work.

Diversity

Diversity forms a key element within the curriculum for all children at Overstone Combined School. Each class has a diversity display board which focuses on the current topic.

During Key Stage 1 topics covered include:

- Examining the culture, climate, people, food and dress in a number of countries around the world
- Barnaby Bear travelling around the world
- Learning about different religions Celebrations around the world
- Tasting different foods
- Listening to music from around the world
- Playing instruments from other countries.

At Key Stage 2 the topics are explored in greater depth:

- Reading stories from other cultures
- Cooking and eating food from other countries.

In addition, some topics are covered as whole school events, recently these have included:

- Black History Week learning about different important black role models through history
- World History Week covering a range of diverse topics.









Home School Agreement

Before your child joins the school, you will be asked to sign a Home-School Agreement. By signing this, you are agreeing to work with us in a number of ways, such as

- ensuring your child's punctuality
- · promoting school rules and
- supporting the school's homework policy.

The Agreement is also signed by the Headteacher, demonstrating the school's commitment in areas such as creating a caring environment and providing access to a broad range of curricular and extracurricular activities.

Communication with parents and carers

We understand the need for good communication between the school and parents/carers.

We aim to communicate with parents and carers by school newsletter sent home with your child or by e-mail, and in person at open events, parents evening, and informally at the beginning or end of the school day, Parents/carers are always welcome and appointments can be easily made to talk directly or by telephone with members of staff.

We hold regular open mornings and open classrooms when parents/carers can come in to see the school at work or after school to see what their child has been doing and their

classroom.

School newsletters are sent out each month, with additional newsletters going weekly to Nursery, Reception and Key Stage 1 and half-termly to Key Stage 2. The website is regularly updated with news and information about forthcoming events. Each Monday a 'Bits and pieces' email is sent with key reminders for the week ahead.

Many parents help voluntarily in the classrooms with activities such as listening to children read and helping with cooking.

In addition, the school has a thriving Parent Teacher Association, which makes a large financial and social contribution through the organisation of a range of exciting and successful events including the annual school fete and bonfire night firework display.

Attendance

Regular and punctual attendance is vital for good educational progress and developing strong relationships. Therefore, if your child is going to be absent for medical reasons you should inform the school by note or by telephone on the morning of the first day, explaining the circumstances







Homework



Homework is set weekly; your child will participate in activities such as reading, spelling, writing, maths and science.

Reports



The school will talk to you about your child's progress on a regular basis. A detailed Annual Report will be sent to you in early July.

Parent Consultations are held in the Autumn and Spring Terms, and in the Summer term parents have the opportunity to consult staff about any queries relating to the Annual Report. Safeguarding children

At Overstone the health, safety and well-being of every child is our paramount concern. We listen to our pupils and take seriously what they tell us. Our aim is that children will enjoy their time as pupils in this school. We want to work in partnership with you to help your child to achieve their full potential and make a positive contribution.

Pastoral care

We have a strong commitment to pastoral care and the well being of the child because it supports learning, encourages positive behaviour and develops strong social skills. There are clear pathways for children who experience medical or emotional problems at school. Initially these may be dealt with by the class teacher, but should this not procure the desired result you, as parents, will be contacted.

Special needs

Some children can have short or longer-term difficulties in one or more areas of the curriculum. Working with parents, the school aims to identify a child's problems early on and work for improvement in these areas. You are encouraged to bring to the school's attention any problem which might affect your child's education.

The school also recognises that a child's special needs may relate to special aptitudes, in which case the school will aim to meet these needs through its curriculum provision.

A support group for parents of children with special educational needs is hosted at the school and meets on a half-termly basis.

Provision for pupils with disabilities

Application for admission to this school for pupils with disabilities is in accordance with the normal arrangements for admissions.

Facilities for access to the buildings and to the curriculum for pupils with disabilities are reviewed according to the individual needs of pupils. Pupils with disabilities join in with curriculum activities with other pupils as far as those particular disabilities will allow.

Gifted and Talented

We recognise the talent of certain pupils in the core and non-core subjects, as well in extra curricular activities such as music and sport. Activities are planned to meet the needs of these pupils as well as to challenge others in an inclusive environment, encouraging all children to fulfil their potential.

Admissions

Children will be admitted to the school on a part-time basis at the beginning of the term after his/her third birthday.

The school serves the area of Wing, Soulbury, Burcott, Mentmore, Ledburn, Crafton, Lower Ascott and Hollingdon. We always like to meet prospective parents in person. If you would like to look round the school, meet the Headteacher and staff and see for yourself what we have to offer, please telephone the School Secretary who will be happy to arrange your visit.

Children from outside the catchment area are also welcomed.

Starting school at 3+

We aim to make your child's transition to the school environment as easy as possible, in particular by liaising closely with parents and providing appropriate contact with any previous establishments your child may have already attended.

Both you and your child will be able to visit us for taster sessions, enabling you both to see the group in operation and to become familiar with our setting. We will also visit you and your child at home before your child starts to ensure all your questions have been answered. This will help yourself and us to discuss the needs of your child and to provide you with an idea of how we run the unit.

We hold an induction meeting for parents of children joining the Nursery and Reception classes and also provide a pack of information before your child starts school.

As your child moves up through the school, you have the opportunity to meet their new class teacher and find out what they will be learning that year at our 'Meet the Teacher' sessions which are held in September.

Attending school full-time

Children are admitted to the Reception class at the start of the school year in which they have their fifth birthday. There is one intake per year and children attend full time from the start of the September term. Please do not hesitate to contact the school office if you have any queries about this.

Wrap around care

Wraparound childcare is available at Little Acorns Childcare from 7.30am to 6.30pm based on the school site. Little Acorns offers Breakfast Club, Lunch Club, Afterschool care and Holiday Club for school-aged children.



What Ofsted said about us (May 2012)
