It has been wonderful to start up Gardening Club on a Friday lunchtime this half term for Years 5 and 6. As the weeks have gone on more and more have come along to take part. Seeing the difference, the children made in the first couple of weeks, encouraged others to join. The endeavours of our work in the Autumn term have certainly paid off as the plants are flourishing in the early spring sunshine. Let's hope there is more sunshine for the Summer Term as Gardening Club returns on a Monday lunchtime for Years 1 and 2.

Nursery Acorn class have been learning about some more people who help us. The children particularly enjoyed role playing being a vet or doctors and nurses. Looking after one another, checking temperatures etc. We have also been learning about Goldilocks and the Three bears. Role playing out the story using props. We have been playing with oats, discussing sizes-big, medium and small. Discussing hard, soft and just right. We have some budding actor/actresses in the making!

Reception Ash class World Book Day saw an array of book characters descend on school as well as those who came dressed ready to curl up with a book. The Year 6s visited and read stories to the children that was enjoyed as much by the Year 6 as the Reception children. The Year 6s were so kind and gentle with the little ones. As a result of 'bubbles' within school, the reception children have not been used to seeing the older children in 'their space' however they took it in their stride.

We have been programming our E.A.R.L.s with instructions to make them move in different directions and have started to make our own maps for them to follow. In music, we are becoming composers to explore the changes of pitch in a piece of our own music played on the recorder...outside on the field!

Year 2 Elm We went to Bletchley Park this month, the children found it fascinating and had this to say about it: "We learnt about the second world war and we had so much fun" Freddie. "We visited the mansion, it was really big and I enjoyed it" Grace. "It was brilliant, I enjoyed dressing up in WW2 clothes" Ewan . "I found out how to crack codes on the enigma machine" Lily. Year 3 Fir We have been investigating forces. We have been comparing the amount of force needed to move a toy car on different surfaces. We have talked about how magnets attract and repel, then we carried out an investigation to see which objects were magnetic.

Last weekend was a good weekend for all who took part in the Cross Country running event. Many Year 3 children entered and we are so proud of them for their enthusiasm and taking part with a big smile on their faces; well done to everyone!

Year 4 Holly/Oak This month we have been so busy in Holly Class it is difficult to pick out one thing we want to share with you. We must talk about our first school trip since Covid came along. Oak and Holly Class enjoyed a really engaging and educational trip to the historic Roman town of St. Albans. We had a wonderful day learning so much more about Roman Life. We are now excited for our next trip in June when we enhance our learning about Rain Forests.

In Science we are learning all about electricity and the technical terms for things. Did you now that the technical term for a battery is a 'cell'? In DT both classes are joining forces to learn all about boats; what is the best hull type? which sail makes a boat go the fastest? We can't wait to share with you next month the boat we will have designed and made. There is a lot of cross curricular learning taking place as looking at boats leads into really well our topic in Geography about 'Water'. In one lesson we had to resort to the 'old fashioned way of learning' as one child put it, as technology was not being our friend! and use a good old paper ordnance survey map to locate a local river and where it started and ended up.

Year 5 Redwood We have recently enjoyed a big art project where we made our own crowns! Some of us made wire sculptures to go inside the clay, then we moulded and painted them. So much fun!

Year 6 Sycamore We have been looking at the benefits and the dangers of the internet. Children worked in groups to put together a presentation to present to the class. They covered various topics such as dealing with trolls, fake news and images that have been changed for an agenda.

Year 6 Willow We had fun dressing up for World Book Day, we got to dress up as our favourite book characters. In the afternoon, we went to read to the Year 3 and Reception children. During the day, we even had a visit from 'Thing 1 & Thing 2' aka Mrs Brain and Mrs Willett
